Didrachms are very rare. May lists only three in his corpus, CNG sold another similar (with griffin having a smooth wing and a feathered breast) 5 years ago (CNG 69, Lot: 230, described as unique and realised \$2,000 plus premiums; also ex CNG 55, lot 55). From the weight this can only be a didrachm and the fact that it is facing left limits it to Abdera.

This coin type originates from Finistere, in the west of Brittany, and is one of a complex series of coinages attributed to the tribe of the Osismii. The reverse bears the human-headed horse which is depicted on many of the Celtic coins from Brittany and Normandy, the area also known as Armorica. Beneath this horse is a bull/cow. The bird on the horse's back may depict an eagle. A few examples have been found in the UK (see CCI 97.0986 for another example of this type).

The style of the horse with its long, knobbed tail, is well attested in the series (cf. DT 181 and 187), but the obverse definitely looks unusual and may be an unrecorded variant of DT 180-187. Fine, reverse better. £150 - £250

A number have been found in the Chichester area.

The style, metal and weight seem to indicate that it comes from a vast Gallo-Belgic series - many varieties, wide distribution - which is known to French dealers and collectors as aux segment de cercles or aux arcs de cercle. The series has traditionally been ascribed to the Remi, and this attribution was maintained by the most recent work: Jean-Marc Doyen, Les subdivisions aux segments de cercle type BN 8030, Mélanges Colbert de Beaulieu, Paris, 1987, p.315-330.

Allen and others at the time but the coins were not finally condemned by Van Arsdell until the 1980s. An interesting episode in the art of forgery aimed at collectors and a useful reference piece.

The cross itself is odd - the top is fourché whilst the left-hand arm has two forks, rather as though the engraver did not even know the significance of what exactly he was engraving. The crouched animals featured on Continental Series X and on the secondary Series N,O,Q, and Type 40 turn their heads backwards, a traditional position of ancient animal representation of the nomads of the Steppes, and from them ultimately transmitted, via several mediators, to the Germanic repertoire. Apart from any possible religious/magical connotation, from the practical point of the die cutter, the arrangement makes it easier for the animal to fit in a roundel. Professor D. M. Metcalf writes: The arguments for and against a London attribution are these: N appears to have been a substantial issue, and its mint place is accordingly likely to have been an important commercial centre. Further, and more cogently, it attracted so much imitation as to suggest that it was perceived by user (particularly north of the Thames) as enjoying a high commercial status. That again points to the probability that it belonged to a major centre.

The shortage of official coinage in the second half of the 18th century led to the second major series of privately issued tokens, mostly copper halfpennies, in the UK, together with many contemporary imitations and forgeries of the official halfpennies. These forgeries are now generally known as 'evasions' and little is known about the clandestine makers. The First Issue halfpennies of George III are dated 1770-75 and no further copper coins were officially issued until the 'cartwheel' coins by Matthew Boulton's Soho, Birmingham mint in 1797.

They became De Grave Short & Co in 1845. W & T Avery bought the company in the 1920s and the De Grave name disappears after 1962. The company made scales and also standard weights and measures for the British and other governments.
